Comments on the Report Regarding Public Security Forces Construction (October 5, 1950)

## **Background Notes:**

- 1. This document includes Mao Zedong's comments on a report submitted by Luo Ruiqing, Minister of Public Security of the Central People's Government, on October 5, 1950.
  - o Mao's comments address two specific points in Luo's report:
    - 1. A request for the Central Government to consider forming an additional Public Security Division to be stationed in North China or Northeast China.
    - 2. A suggestion to promptly form the already-approved Public Security Forces, ensuring their quality, and discussing this issue with Central Bureau leaders during their meetings in Beijing.
- 2. Nie refers to Nie Rongzhen, who was then serving as Acting Chief of Staff of the Military Commission of the Central People's Government.
- 3. Summary of Luo Ruiqing's Report:
  - The nationwide regular Public Security Forces were initially planned to include 180,000 personnel, organized into 21 Public Security Divisions and one Public Security Guard Division, totaling 22 divisions.
  - To date, 11 divisions and 1 regiment had been formed, with 9 divisions and 2 regiments yet to be organized, along with 1 Railway Public Security Command.
  - Luo emphasized that the approved forces should be promptly assembled for training and gradual assumption of internal defense tasks.
  - Based on Mao's earlier guidance in March regarding the importance of quality over quantity in Public Security Forces, Luo suggested allocating mid-tier troops with relatively better composition when forming these units.
  - Additionally, Luo requested consideration for forming an extra division for North or Northeast China.

## Mao's Conclusion:

- Approves forming an additional Public Security Division.
- Suggests resolving specific details through direct discussions with key leaders.
